The Birth Of Democracy

How and where did the concept of democracy originate?



We all know that democracy has transformed our lives and the way that society has decide upon laws. However, when did it start?

In ancient Athens, citizens would gather on an old hill called the Pnyx. Here they decide the city laws and who sit on its ruling council. This was democracy or rule slaves by the people. All 30000 citizens were men. Woman and slaves didn't get a say. Citizens could spread for the time it took for water to pour from one jar to another. When it ran out it was the next persons turn.

A jury of 500 citizens decided if someone was guilty of law-breaking. Punishments including death. Citizens could also vote to get rid of people they disliked. Each man wrote a name on a broken bit of pottery called an "ostracon". Anyone named more than 600 times got kicked out of the city.

This ostracon has the name "Themisocles" written on it. He led the Athenian navy in the war with Persia, but was later ostracised (banished).



So when you vote remember you are using an ancient Greek way of making decisions.

Spotlight: Communism

How did the concept of communism originate and function?





Communism is a political belief system when there are no poor and no rich but everyone is financially equal. You could not choose your jobs or choose your price of your goods. The first communist leader was Valdimir Lenin from Russia.

One of the biggest moments in communist history was when the USSR [UNION of SOVI-ET SOCIALIST REPUBLICS] was created; a collection of Eastern European countries that Russia had liberated in the Second World War. Communism is political, economic and social philosophy and the founder of modern day communism was a German economist Karl Marx who wrote (THE COMMUNIST MANIFESTO in 1848) that was the beginning of a smart but ruthless regime.

One of the most ruthless Soviet leaders was Josef Stalin who has been thought to be on of the biggest killers of all time with over 20 MILLION DEATHS! - most of them his own people.

Profile: Margaret Thatcher

An undoubtedly divisive Prime Minister but what are the true facts ?



Early life:

Margaret Hilda Thatcher was born on the 15th of October 1925.She attended City Law school before studying at Somerville College, Oxford where she worked briefly as a research chemist before becoming a barrister. Along with her husband Denis Thatcher, she had two children named Carol Thatcher and Mark Thatcher.

Career:

She was elected a member of parliament for Finchley in 1959. She was the UK's Prime Minister from 1979-1990. Additionally, she was also the longest serving British Prime Minister of the 20th Century. Margaret's nickname was "the Iron Lady". She introduced a series of economic polices intended to address high unemployment and Britain's struggles.

Her political philosophy and economic polices emphasised: deregulation (in the financial sector), flexible labour markets, the privatisation of state owned companies and reducing the power and influence of trade unions.

Sadly Margaret died on the 8th of April 2013. Socialists found her menacing whilst others supported her. Now you know the facts—what is your opinion?
