Suggested ideas:

- Create a 2D/3D map of the UK showing all the major cities, counties and physical features (Rivers, mountains, lakes)
- Design and create a tourist leaflet about a coastal town. Where is the town located? How would you get there? What makes the town a great tourist attraction?
- Create a collage of photos of your day out to a coastal town in the UK– what did you see and learn? Did you spot any examples of coastal erosion?
- Write a newspaper report which reports on a coastal town which has been effected by coastal erosion. What happened? Were there any eye witnesses?
- Create a presentation about coastal erosion. What is coastal erosion? Which areas of the UK are affected the most? How can we prevent coastal erosion?
- Create a quiz or board game about the UK using facts and information such the largest cities, highest mountain, longest river etc
- Compare the differences between children growing up near the coast and children growing up in London.
- Be an expert! Can you create a model or diagram that explains how coastal erosion occurs?
