

### PUPIL PREMIUM REPORT 2013-14 and 2014-15

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their wealthier peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011, and paid to local authorities by means of a specific grant based on the school census numbers of children who have claimed FSM in the past 6 years. These funds are in addition to the main school budget. There is a requirement to report on how the pupil premium is being spent and to evaluate the impact on pupil attainment and achievement.

In the financial year 2013-14, the pupil premium was allocated at a rate of £900 per pupil and is set at £1,300 per pupil for the financial year 2014-15. The final figures were calculated using the January 2013 school census data.

Millfields Community School received £187,741 for the financial year 2013-14 and is set to receive £256,100 for the financial year 2014-15.

### The main aims of the pupil premium are to:

- Increase social mobility
- Enable more pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds to access the best education
- Reduce the attainment gap between the highest and lowest achieving pupils

There are many perceived difficulties of evaluating the outcomes of educational expenditure and improvement in pupil's learning. The use of Millfields Data Tracker that is used to track individuals' progress throughout their time at Millfields will be the main part of our evaluation process. In addition we will be monitoring other factors such as attendance and punctuality, parental involvement along with how well the initiatives are accessed by the identified pupils

At Millfields, we have high aspirations and ambitions for all of our children and we believe that no child should be left behind. We strongly believe that it is not about where you come from but your passion and thirst for knowledge, and your dedication and commitment to learning that make the difference between success and failure, and we are determined to ensure that our children are given every chance to realise their full potential. Pupil premium funding represents a significant proportion of our budget and we have a policy that outlines how we will ensure it is spent to maximum effect.

- Improve day to day teaching
- Increase learning time
- Individualise support
- Enrichment beyond the curriculum
- Monitor and evaluate
