

Year 4 Reading

By the end of year 4 children are expected to be able to:

Use a range of strategies to read new texts

Read with fluency, understanding and expression

Locate the evidence in a text to answer simple questions

Show a deeper understanding of the text by 'reading between the lines' for information that it inferred rather than obvious

Talk about the way the text has been organised

Talk about the ways in which the writer uses language and words

Say what they think about texts

Pick out some links between similar plots, settings and authors

Your child is now becoming a fluent reader and will have probably developed a preference for different genres. He/She may not be as willing to read to you any more but it is still important to have discussions about the books that they are reading. Where possible, you should try to read some of the books your child is reading so that you can discuss the characters and events the author has used. It is still important to encourage your child to use the library to research topics being studied in school.

Year 4 Writing

By the end of year 4 children are expected to be able to:

Use adjectives and adverbs to create variety and add interest for the reader

Compose a complex sentence using a subordinate clause

Begin to use commas to separate phrases and clauses in sentences

Use commas to mark clauses and use the apostrophe for possession

Use connectives to extend sentences

Sequence ideas or material logically

Structure writing to suit the purpose of the text

Link sentences within paragraphs using pronouns or adverbials

Choose appropriate ideas and attempt to adopt a view-point

Select words for effect

Use correct spelling of common words and compound words

Use a legible handwriting style showing consistent letter formation, sometimes joined

There are many opportunities to develop writing within the home. Encourage children to write their own thank you letters or cards. Lots of children enjoy typing on the computer rather than writing stories by hand—encourage this as much as possible as they are still developing the written word.
