
MILLFIELDS GOES GREEN AGAIN!

After this, Jasmine from the Orange Overlords, spoke with a friendly smile. She voiced her concerns about the environment and she wants people from year 3 and upwards to do a daily litter pick. Jasmine expressed that she would like the dinners to have more of a variety as many people might not like them. Jasmine had a very well put together speech.
