

Suffragettes: 100 Year Anniversary



Before 1918, women didn't have the right to vote. Lots of women worked very hard to get their rights but there was this this one woman who's name was Millicent Fawcett.

Fawcett believed in peaceful protest. She tirelessly campaigned for women's rights to vote until a group of ladies named the Suffragettes who did terrible things just to vote. These things included: getting run over by a horse, starving themselves in prison and having numerous marches.

The suffragettes fought for middleclass and property-owning women. Led by people like Emmeline Pankhurst, there influences included Russian methods like hunger strikes. After roughly ten years of fighting for their rights, the Suffragettes finally won the battle and had the right to vote. In fact, New Zealand was one of the first countries to let women vote. The Suffragettes battle will be remembered for many years to come.

Additionally, three days ago, there were marches to remember the suffragettes in Cardiff, Belfast, London and Edinburgh the streets were full of green, white and purple - the suffragette colours.

Women's rights are still not equal to men's but we feminists are all working to make it fair thanks to the Suffragettes and our ancestors.
