Brexit - Suspension of Parliament

How Boris Johnson's controversial Brexit plan started off

On Tuesday 24th of September 2019, the Supreme Court (the highest court in the country, made up of 12 judges) ruled that UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson's suspension of parliament was unlawful, and so parliament was reopened to allow MPs to debate further on Brexit.

What is suspending parliament and why did the Prime Minister choose to do so?

On the 10th of September Boris Johnson, the Prime Minister, carried out his plan to suspend parliament which he had announced in late August. When parliament is suspended it means that MPs can no longer sit in parliament and debate the government's decisions.

This meant that they were not able to debate Brexit and try to push the government towards making a deal with the EU (European Union) and try to prevent a "no deal Brexit." Boris Johnson claimed that his choice to prorogue (suspend) parliament was to allow for a Queen's speech (an announcement of the government's plans for new laws).

What did the supreme court say?


Lady Hale, wearing a wicked spider brooch, delivered the verdict saying: "The decision to advise her majesty to prorogue parliament was unlawful because it had the effect of frustrating or preventing the ability of parliament to carry out its constitutional functions."

What happened next?

Boris Johnson had to cut short his trip to New York to return to parliament. He said that he "strongly disagrees" with the supreme court's decision but that he will respect it. Many MPs called for him to resign but he didn't even apologise about his "unlawful" behavior.

UPDATE! Currently, Boris has negotiated a deal on which parliament will potentially vote upon.
